<b>New York Sour</b>	235,000
<i>The marriage of refreshing &amp; tart components make for a visually pleasing post-winter classic</i>	
<b>Manhattan</b>	250,000
<i>A perfectly balanced mix between American rye &amp; Italian vermouth; a single dash of Angostura is added to round the drink</i>	
<b>Ward 8</b>	155,000
<i>Created amidst a political election in Massachusetts, this sweet yet citrus cocktail packs a subtle punch of charred oak</i>	

## *Prohibition Era*

<b>Bee's Knees</b>	155,000
<i>A prohibition-era classic, with herbal &amp; citrus hints balanced by silky sweetness of honey</i>	
<b>Mary Pickford</b>	125,000
<i>A fruity rum cocktail invented for a Canadian-American film actress during her Cuban escapade with Charlie Chaplin</i>	
<b>White Lady</b>	185,000
<i>Two different bartenders in two different countries claim it; the result is one deliciously citrus &amp; slightly herbal concoction</i>	
<b>Bacardi Cocktail</b>	185,000
<i>A staple of the 1930s bar repertoire; a simple twist of the classic Daiquiri, adding a fruity hint of sweetness &amp; a little bit of colour</i>	

## *Contemporary Classics*

<b>Moscow Mule</b>	175,000
<i>Homemade ginger syrup &amp; fresh lime create a slightly spicy yet refreshing rendition of the 1940s classic</i>	
<b>Gypsy Queen</b>	250,000
<i>One of the earliest vodka based mixes; an American creation featuring a bold flavour &amp; complex herbal notes</i>	
<b>Vieux Carre</b>	215,000
<i>A distant relative of both Sazerac &amp; the Hurricane, this New Orleans signature packs strong &amp; complex flavours from different corners of the globe</i>	
<b>Tom Collins</b>	165,000
<i>A refreshingly simple gin cocktail - inspired by a lame joke in 1874 &amp; popularized in America after the Prohibition</i>
